

Sermon

The Right Reverend Manuel Ernesto, Bishop of Nampula, Mozambique

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God. begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven. was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

Giving of Communion

The Bishop invites the people to receive the Holy Communion, saying Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.

Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,
but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

Please sit, and then follow the directions of the Virgers and Stewards.

Holy Communion is offered in both kinds, but you are free to receive in one kind only. If you do wish to receive in both kinds, please do not dip the Eucharistic wafers into the wine.

If you are baptised and receive communion in your own church, you are welcome to receive communion here.

If you require a gluten free wafer, please identify yourself to a Virger or Steward, and receive communion from the President.

You are welcome to receive a blessing instead of communion. If you wish to receive a blessing, please keep your head bowed.



ALMA: Angola London Mozambique Association

ALMA is the twenty-five-year Companion Link Partnership between the Anglican churches in London, Angola and Mozambique, that began formally here in St Paul's Cathedral in July 1998. Our renewed Covenant was signed last summer when all ALMA Bishops were together at the 2022 Lambeth Conference.

'ALMA is part of the network of Companion Links that characterise the Anglican Communion. As partners in the Gospel in a covenant relationship undergirded by prayer, we learn with and from each other, giving mutual support in our ministry and mission, worship and witness. Our priorities for the next decade are making disciples, serving our communities with compassion, growing the Church, teaching theology, learning from young people and striving for climate justice and creation care.'

Over these 25 years we have both rejoiced and mourned with each other:

- Rejoicing as we have seen the church grow from 2 to 3 to 8 dioceses in Mozambique (3 times the size of the UK) and from 1 to 4 dioceses in Angola (5 times the size of the UK); and then in September 2021 to see our partners become an autonomous Portuguese speaking province of the Anglican Communion with the Archbishop of Canterbury visiting in November 2022 to formally inaugurate Igreja Anglicana de Mocambique Angola (IAMA).
- Mourning the impact of the Cabo Delgado conflict in Northern Mozambique with over one million Internally Displaced People who have suffered hugely; and the impact of climate emergencies, with drought in Angola and Mozambique's unique vulnerability to Cyclones which have regularly devastated homes, churches, clinics, schools and core infrastructure.

Prayer and friendship underpin our relationship. Each Wednesday London's Diocesan Cycle of Prayer prays for ALMA partners and is recorded online. We pray for each other by name, remembering the challenges our churches and countries face. Despite distance, and the many differences in our contexts there is much we share as we worship and witness to the incarnational love of Christ. Through the lens of this 'soul' friendship (in Portuguese 'Alma' means soul) our London parish and school links have a profound connection with the wider church. Improved communications, zoom and social media have enabled these relationships to grow in many creative ways.

May we also thank you for your support for our 2023 Lent Appeal with MANNA for Conflict Trauma Support in Cabo Delgado. This is such important work and we are very grateful.
