A reading from the Book Genesis.

After two whole years, Pharaoh dreamed that he was standing by the Nile, and there came up out of the Nile seven sleek and fat cows, and they grazed in the reed grass. Then seven other cows, ugly and thin, came up out of the Nile after them, and stood by the other cows on the bank of the Nile. The ugly and thin cows ate up the seven sleek and fat cows. And Pharaoh awoke. Then he fell asleep and dreamed a second time; seven ears of grain, plump and good, were growing on one stalk. Then seven ears, thin and blighted by the east wind, sprouted after them. The thin ears swallowed up the seven plump and full ears. Pharaoh awoke, and it was a dream. In the morning his spirit was troubled; so he sent and called for all the magicians of Egypt and all its wise men. Pharaoh told them his dreams, but there was no one who could interpret them to Pharaoh.

Then the chief cupbearer said to Pharaoh, "I remember my faults today. Once Pharaoh was angry with his servants, and put me and the chief baker in custody in the house of the captain of the guard. We dreamed on the same night, he and I, each having a dream with its own meaning. A young Hebrew was there with us, a servant of the captain of the guard. When we told him, he interpreted our dreams to us, giving an interpretation to each according to his dream. As he interpreted to us, so it turned out; I was restored to my office, and the baker was hanged." Then Pharaoh sent for Joseph, and he was hurriedly brought out of the dungeon. When he had shaved himself and changed his clothes, he came in before Pharaoh. And Pharaoh said to Joseph, "I have had a dream, and there is no one who can interpret it. I have heard it said of you that when you hear a dream you can interpret it." Joseph answered Pharaoh, "It is not I; God will give Pharaoh a favorable answer."

Then Joseph said to Pharaoh, "Pharaoh's dreams are one and the same; God has revealed to Pharaoh what he is about to do. The seven good cows are seven years, and the seven good ears are seven years; the dreams are one. The seven lean and ugly cows that came up after them are seven years, as are the seven empty ears blighted by the east wind. They are seven years of famine. It is as I told Pharaoh; God has shown to Pharaoh what he is about to do. There will come seven years of great plenty throughout all the land of Egypt. After them there will arise seven years of famine, and all the plenty will be forgotten in the land of Egypt; the famine will consume the land. The plenty will no longer be known in the land because of the famine that will follow, for it will be very grievous. And the doubling of Pharaoh's dream means that the thing is fixed by God, and God will shortly bring it about.

Now therefore let Pharaoh select a man who is discerning and wise, and set him over the land of Egypt. Let Pharaoh proceed to appoint overseers over the land, and take one-fifth of the produce of the land of Egypt during the seven plenteous years. Let them gather all the food of these good years that are coming, and lay up grain under the authority of Pharaoh for food in the cities, and let them keep it. That food shall be a reserve for the land against the seven years of famine that are to befall the land of Egypt, so that the land may not perish through the famine." The proposal pleased Pharaoh and all his servants.

## Giving of Communion

The Bishop of London invites the people to receive the Holy Communion, saying Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.

Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

Please sit, and then follow the directions of the Virgers and Stewards.

Holy Communion is offered in both kinds, but you are free to receive in one kind only. If you do wish to receive in both kinds, please do not dip the Eucharistic wafers into the wine.

If you are baptised and receive communion in your own church, you are welcome to receive communion here.

If you require a gluten free wafer, please identify yourself to a Virger or Steward, and receive communion from the Bishop.

You are welcome to receive a blessing instead of communion. If you wish to receive a blessing, please keep your head bowed.

# ALMA: Angola London Mozambique Association

**ALMA** is the Companion Link Partnership between the Anglican churches in London, Angola and Mozambique, that began twenty seven years ago, here, in St Paul's Cathedral, in July 1998. Our renewed Covenant was signed in 2022 when all ALMA Partner Bishops were together at the Lambeth Conference.

**ALMA** is part of the network of Companion Links between Dioceses that characterise the Anglican Communion. As partners in the Gospel in our covenantal relationship is undergirded by prayer. We learn with and from each other and give mutual support in our ministry and mission, worship and witness, action and advocacy. Our priorities for the next decade are making disciples, serving our communities with compassion, growing the Church, teaching theology, learning from young people and striving for climate justice and creation care.

Over these 27 years, we have both rejoiced and mourned with each other:

- **Rejoicing** as we have seen the church grow from 2 to 3 to 8 dioceses in Mozambique (3 times the size of the UK) and from 1 to 4 dioceses in Angola (5 times the size of the UK); and then in September 2021 to see our partners become an autonomous Portuguese speaking province of the Anglican Communion with the Archbishop of Canterbury visiting in November 2022 to formally inaugurate Igreja Anglicana de Mocambique e Angola (IAMA).
- Mourning the impact of the ongoing conflict in Cabo Delgado in Northern Mozambique where over one million people have been internally displaced; the impact of climate emergencies, with drought and cholera in Angola, across central Southern Africa and into Mozambique, alongside Mozambique's unique vulnerability to Cyclones, where three Cyclones between December 2024 and March 2025 have devastated homes, churches, clinics, schools and core infrastructure, and greatly challenged the churches capacity to respond.

Prayer and friendship underpin our relationship. Every Wednesday, London's Diocesan Cycle of Prayer prays for ALMA partners, and this is recorded online. We pray for each other by name, remembering the challenges our churches and countries face. Despite distance, and the many differences in our contexts there is much we share as we worship and witness to the incarnational love of Christ. Through the lens of this 'soul' friendship (in Portuguese 'Alma' means soul) our London parish and school links have a profound connection with the wider church. Improved communications and social media have enabled these relationships to grow in many creative ways. This year we welcome the new Primate of the Anglican Church of Mozambique and Angola, Archbishop Vicente Msosa, Bishop of Zambezia in Mozambique, to our ALMA Sunday Service and hold him in our prayers. He was installed at a special service in Luanda in January 2025, a joyous occasion shared by Bishop Lusa Nsenga Ngoy, London's Bishop for ALMA, and a small delegation from London.
